




ANSWER D: Polo shirts

As they were rebelling against a society grown increasingly conformist and repressive, they were focused on freedom and getting back to nature. The hippies were usually aged between 14 and 26.

Hippie clothing was often loose and made of natural fibers like cotton and hemp. Men and women grew their hair long and eschewed products and fussy styling.

The black turtlenecks and trousers worn by the Beatniks, male and female, morphed into peasant blouse and jeans. Anything handmade, whether sewn, knit or woven as macramé, was prized. Gradually, this extended towards dyeing one's own clothes, and the colorful tie-dye style became popular



ANSWER C: Hipster which means a trendy young person (when you have style)

The word hippie is derived from the word hip, which conveys being up-to-date and fashionable. This meaning of hip is thought to have originated with African Americans during the Jive Era of the 1930s and '40s.

"hip" was commonly applied to the BEATS, such as Allen Ginsberg and Jack Kerouac, who represented and inspired the bohemian artist communities in San Francisco, Los Angeles and New yok City.

He is considered to be one of the leading figures of both the Beat generation during the 1950s and the counter culture that followed.





Bob Dylan reportedly said no because one of his kids fell ill. There was also a rumor that he had become annoyed with the gathering hippies around his home, which stood near the town of Woodstock. Whatever the reason, it didn't keep him from playing another huge festival -- and just two weeks later -- at the Isle of Wight. Dylan reportedly left for England aboard the Queen Elizabeth 2 on August 15, 1969, the day the original Woodstock Festival started. Dylan then moved away from upstate New York, complaining that his house was being beseiged by "druggies."

Jimmy Hendrix was an American rock guitarist, singer and songwriter. He is regarded as one of the greatest electric guitarists in the history of rock music.

His performance at the Woodstock Festival in 1969 was a mind-blowing event that has stuck in people's minds: as the last artist to perform, he played a memorable psychedelic rendition of the US national anthem "The star-Spangled banner", imitating war sounds like gunfire and explosions with his guitar, thus denouncing the Vietnam War.
